



Policing Hertfordshire in the First World War

What is the project about?

We want to bring to life the history of the Hertfordshire Constabulary, initially focusing on policing during the First World War. To do this we aim to make use of a rare set of Hertfordshire police records which date from the mid nineteenth century to 1919. This rare and extensive collection includes over 20,000 pages of incident books, policemen's daily logs, receipts, lost and found reports and notes about the day to day running of a police station.



What will we do?

A grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund will enable the Museum and Hertfordshire Archives and Local Studies to:

Make the fragile police records available online, on a searchable website - explore the history of Hertfordshire policing.

We want to help you accredit these projects through Arts Award and are working with the [First World War Centenary Partnership](#), led by [IWM](#) (Imperial War Museums). Organisations involved in FWW projects are encouraged to join the [partnership](#).

Children and young people aged up to 25 will have the opportunity to achieve a **special edition First World War Centenary Arts Award certificate** if they have worked with creative projects to commemorate the First World War for their Arts Award.

Advisers will be able to request to receive **Special Edition certificates** when making a moderation booking or placing an order for Discover certificates **from September 2014**.
